Introduction

This report sets out the results of the Equality Impact Assessment (EqIA) of the South Warwickshire Local Plan Regulation 19 Pre-submission Local Plan 2025-2050. The purpose of an EqIA is to assess the likely impact of the policies of the Local Plan on different community groups, and how the needs of such groups have been considered in relation to the development of the policies.

The joint local plan details the policies for the period 2025-2050. It will replace the existing [Stratford-on-Avon Core Strategy](#), adopted in July 2016 and [Warwick Local Plan](#) adopted in September 2017.

The Local Plan contains:

- a long-term vision for the area and the strategic objectives and policies that will guide development over the plan period.
- site allocations to deliver the new development to meet the growth, employment and other needs of the area.
- Detailed thematic policies to guide and assist new development.

Equality implications and obligations

The need for an EqIA to be undertaken originates from the duty placed on Local Authorities to eliminate unlawful discrimination when carrying out its functions, and promote equality of opportunity between genders, different racial groups, and other equality groups.

Under the Equality Act 2010, the Council must comply with the Public Sector Equality Duty to:

- eliminate unlawful discrimination, harassment, and victimisation.
- advance equality of opportunity between those who share a protected characteristic and those who do not; and
- foster good relations between people who share a protected characteristic and those who do not.

It is important to consider who is affected by the Local Plan i.e. who are the customers of the service. In theory everyone is, in some ways, directly or indirectly are affected by the Local Plan. However, some groups of people are more likely to be affected than others.

This would for example include those applying for planning permission (such as individuals, business, and developers), people living in the area and those professionally involved in planning, the voluntary sector and other service providers.

The purpose of the EqIA

The purpose of the EqIA is to assess the potential impact of the policies in the new Local Plan on different groups within the SWLP Plan area. An assessment of the new Local Plan policies has been undertaken in relation to the groups with the following protected characteristics (as defined by the Equalities Act 2010):

- **Age:** this refers to a person being a particular age or being within an age group. This includes all ages, including older people, children and young people
- **Disability:** a person has a disability if she or he has a physical impairment which has a substantial and long-term adverse effect on their ability to carry out normal day to day activities, e.g. physical, sensory, mental, or learning impairment;
- **Gender or Sex:** this is someone being either male or female;
- **Race:** this includes colour, nationality (including citizenship), ethnic, or national origins;
- **Religion and belief:** religion means any religion, including a reference to a lack of religion. Belief includes religious and philosophical beliefs, any religious/faith or other groups with a recognised belief system or lack of belief;
- **Sexual orientation:** this is whether a person's sexual attraction is towards their own sex, the opposite sex, or to both sexes;
- **Gender reassignment:** this relates to people who are transitioning from one gender to another;
- **Pregnancy and maternity:** this includes expectant mothers and mothers who have recently had a child. Protection against maternity discrimination is for 26 weeks after giving birth.
- **Marriage and civil partnership:** this includes married couple or those in civil partnership.

Contextual Baseline Data for Each Group

Table 1 summarises the baseline information of the different protected characteristics and Income and Deprivation, which are focused upon as part of the assessment.

Gender or Sex	The 2021 Census indicates that 51.5% of the population in Stratford-on-Avon District was female and 48.5% male. For Warwick District, 50.3% of the population was female and 49.7% was male. ⁵
Disability	The 2021 Census shows that 16.1% of the population in Stratford-on-Avon District were identified as disabled under the Equality Act. Of these, 5.9% said their day-to-day activities were limited a lot and 10.2% a little. In Warwick District, 15.2% of the population were identified as disabled under the Equality Act. Of these, 5.6% said their day-to-day activities were limited a lot and 9.6% a little. 24.4% of people in Stratford-on-Avon District state they have a long-term health problem or disability, and 23.3% of people in Warwick District. ⁶
Race	<p>The 2021 Census shows that 95.5% of the population in Stratford-on-Avon District was in the White ethnic group. 1.9% identified as Asian or Asian British, 1.7% were Mixed or Multiple ethnic groups, 0.4% identified as Black, Black British, Caribbean or African, and 0.5% were from other ethnic groups. 	Avon District's population stated that they had no religion, and 40% of the population in Warwick District. In Stratford-on-Avon District, 0.5% of the population were Hindu, 0.5% were Muslim, 0.4% were Sikh, 0.3% were Buddhist, and 0.1% were Jewish. In Warwick District, 4.2% of the population were Sikh, 2.5% were Hindu, 1.5% were Muslim, 0.4% were Buddhist, and 0.2% were Jewish. ⁷
Sexual orientation	The 2021 Census shows that 91.6% of the population in Stratford-on-Avon District and 89.8% of the population in Warwick District described themselves as straight or heterosexual. 2.2% described themselves as LGB+ in Stratford-on-Avon District, and 3.3% in Warwick. The remaining percentage did not answer this question.
Gender assignment	<p>The 2021 Census shows that 95.1% of Stratford-on-Avon District's population described themselves as having a gender identity the same as their sex registered at birth. 0.2% had a gender identify different from that registered at birth. In Warwick, 94.4% described themselves as having a gender identity the same as their sex registered at birth. 0.4% had a gender identity different from that registered at birth. The remaining percentages for both Districts did not answer the question.⁸</p> <p>The Census statistics for this topic at local geography levels are regarded as having a degree of uncertainty since patterns in the data suggest some respondents may not have interpreted the question correctly.⁹</p>
Pregnancy and maternity	In Stratford-on-Avon District there were 1,194 live births in 2024. In Warwick District there were 1,334 live births in the same year ¹⁰ . In 2024, the total fertility rate (TFR) for Stratford-on-Avon

	District was 1.47 children per woman. For Warwick District the TFR was 1.29 children per woman. ¹¹
Marriage and civil partnership	The 2021 census shows that in Stratford-on-Avon District 52.5% of the population over 16 years old were married or in a civil partnership. 28.4% of the population had never married or registered a civil partnership. 2.0% were separated but still legally married or in a civil partnership. 9.8% were divorced or formerly in a civil partnership. 7.2% were widowed or surviving partner from a civil partnership. In Warwick District, 46.1% of the population over 16 years old were married or in a civil partnership. 37.9% of the population had never married or registered a civil partnership. 1.7% were separated but still legally married or in a civil partnership. 8.5% were divorced or formerly in a civil partnership. 5.8% were widowed or surviving partner from a civil partnership. ¹²

Summary of Impact analysis by Characteristic

The Local Plan contains 21 strategic policies, 22 infrastructure related policies, 7 employment/retail policies 13 housing policies, 8 climate change related policies and 16 built and natural environment related policies. The underlying principle of all the policies is to deliver sustainable development to secure a better quality of life for everyone, now and for future generations. All the policies within the Plan contribute towards achieving sustainable development, with policies promoting the location of new homes and employment opportunities, improved infrastructure, conservation and enhancement of the natural, built, and historic environment, provision of renewable energy, green spaces, sport and recreation, and the development of sustainable and well-connected communities.

Most of the policies within the Plan will benefit the wider community across the SWLP Plan area and not specifically those with protected characteristics. However, some policies will have the potential for some direct or indirect impact on different groups. Each policy has been assessed for its potential positive, negative, or neutral impact on the protected characteristic groups.

The strategic growth locations and new settlements along with local growth areas aim to deliver sustainable homes with adequate infrastructure based on local needs. All the locations contribute towards achieving sustainable development, promoting the location of new homes and employment opportunities, improved infrastructure, conservation and enhancement of the natural, built, and historic environment, provision of renewable energy, green spaces, sport and recreation, and the development of sustainable and well-connected communities.

Age

The age protected characteristics include the consideration of all ages in society, the assessment of which recognises that vulnerability can change across age groups and the impact of a policy will not necessarily be uniform across all ages. The assessment identified that the impact of SWLP policies were generally positive for all, with some having a particularly positive impact on this group. The SWLP aims to provide sustainable development addressing the needs of the current and wider population; this includes provision and access to healthcare, education and training, jobs, appropriate accommodation, and leisure facilities. The policies within the Plan are written positively to ensure that needs are appropriately assessed and addressed through individual development proposals; for example, Policy HO.1 Housing Mix which sets out the requirements of housing provision for various age groups Policy HO.3 Affordable Housing Requirements set out the thresholds for affordable homes

provision. Policy HO.2 Space Standards and Accessibility will ensure the new developments are designed to comply with Nationally Described Space Standards (NDDS) and meet the accessibility needs of wheelchair users and are capable of being adaptable to meet the needs of people with different types of disabilities.

In terms of infrastructure, the SWLP makes provision for new and enhanced education across the area, with the allocation of sites for both primary and secondary schools in a number of locations serving both the urban and rural parts of the area. Policies also seek to protect local services and facilities, which are particularly important for older and younger residents who may be less able to travel to meet their day-to-day needs.

Disability

The policies within the Local Plan are identified as being generally positive for all within society, with some policies having positive impacts on this characteristic group. A number of the policies in the Local Plan address the needs of those with disabilities, either directly or indirectly; for example, Policy HO.2 Space Standards and Accessibility which will ensure new developments are accessible and capable of being adaptable to meet the needs of less able people. Policy DS.19-Well Designed Places makes provision for the development needs of all people regardless of age, gender or disability.

Gender Assignment

The policies within the SWLP are regarded as being generally positive for all and as having no impact on this group. The promotion of equal opportunities is integral to the integrity of the Plan to support sustainable development. The SWLP is inclusive of all members of the community and does not discriminate against any gender reassignment.

Race

The policies within the SWLP are regarded as being generally positive for all; the only policy within the Local Plan that had a positive impact directed particularly at the ethnicity protected characteristic group is various policies including HO.8-Protecting Existing Accommodation for the Travelling Community, HO.11- Accommodation for Boat Dwellers will have a positive impact on the travelling community.

Religion

The policies within the SWLP are regarded as being generally positive for all and as having no differential impact on this group. The promotion of equal opportunities is integral to the integrity of the Plan to support sustainable development. The SWLP is inclusive to all members of the community and does not discriminate against any religion.

Sex

The policies within the SWLP are regarded as being generally positive for all and as having no differential impact on this group. The promotion of equal opportunities is core to the integrity of the Plan to support sustainable development. The Plan is inclusive of all members of the community and does not discriminate against sex.

Sexual Orientation

The policies within the SWLP are regarded as being generally positive for all and as having no differential impact on this group. The promotion of equal opportunities is core to the integrity of the Plan to support sustainable development. The Plan is inclusive of all members of the community and does not discriminate against sexual orientation.

Pregnancy and Maternity

The policies within the SWLP are regarded as being generally positive for all. Given the potential healthcare and community infrastructure needs of this protected characteristic group, some of the policies in the Plan have highlighted a positive impact on this group through the assessment of where new health provision is required, or land is allocated for new provision. For example, Policy ID.1- Securing Infrastructure Provision ensures that essential infrastructure including healthcare is provided as part of new development and a number of sites are specifically allocated for meeting these needs. The concept plans for strategic growth locations and new settlements include details of healthcare infrastructure needs of each location based on local needs.

Next Steps

During the Examination of the Local Plan, the Inspector may propose “Main Modifications” to address issues of soundness and/or legal compliance. If this is the case, additional consultation will be undertaken on the ‘Main Modifications’ and, as such, an EqIA addendum will be prepared and published to accompany any such consultation.
